

### CODE OF ETHICS

"As a law enforcement Deputy, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all men to liberty, equality, and justice.

### What We Do

### Patrol Division

- Deputies patrol the roads and neighborhoods of Frederick County, ensuring safety
- Deputies handle criminal responses such as burglary, animal complaints, traffic related issues, accident investigation, business checks, alarm calls, protective orders, detention orders, commitment orders, and other misdemeanor and felony related arrests
- Deputies are responsible for case preparation and presenting cases in the courtroom
- Deputies assigned to the Traffic Unit handle a vast array of traffic related issues such as traffic accidents, accident investigations, traffic fatality investigations, traffic complaints, speed enforcement, issuance of citations when needed, and other law enforcement duties when required
- The need for traffic enforcement continues to increase as the community grows

#### Investigative Division

Handles all major felony cases and the more serious and violent misdemeanor cases, in addition to special
investigations into drug, gangs, child pornography, child sexual abuse, child physical abuse, white collar
crime, and internet crimes against children

### School Safety Division

- Provide safety, security, training, law related education for students and faculty of the Frederick County Public School System
- Instruct D.A.R.E., teach Civilian Response to Active Shooter Training combined with Stop the Bleed
- Help promote law enforcement friendly community relations with young people by providing programs such as Lunch Buddies, Tribute <u>Tuesdays</u> and Freedom Fridays

### Court Security/Civil Process


- Responsible for providing security for the Frederick County court rooms

### Special Operations Division


Responsible for all emergency teams and K-9 patrol

# VALOR AWARDS 2022

The Top of Virginia Regional Chamber of Commerce held their 2022 Valor Awards on 10/06/2022. Several members of the Frederick County Sheriff's Office were recognized for actions going "above and beyond" in saving and/or safeguarding lives.

### LIFESAVING AWARD

On Jan. 31, 2022, Deputy C. Thurgood responded to Mulberry St. in Stephens City for a report of an unconscious male who was not breathing. Upon arrival, Deputy Thurgood began CPR on the victim who was not breathing, and had no pulse. SCPD Chief B. Copp arrived on scene with an AED unit as Thurgood continued CPR but the AED recommended no shock be delivered. Deputy Thurgood provided CPR until the male began to breath on his own and became responsive. After being transported to the hospital by EMS, the 84-year-old victim was discovered to have suffered a heart attack and was showing signs of improvement.



### **MERITORIUS ACTION AWARD**


On Dec. 26, 2021, Deputy J. Hawse and Deputy A. Ament responded to the Virginia Welcome Center on I-81 for reports of several victims who had been shot as the result of a domestic dispute. Being the very first to arrive, Hawse and Ament determined the suspect, later identified as 34-year-old Cesar was not a present threat. Deputies Hawse, and Ament, began administering lifesaving aid to all four gunshot victims to include applying tourniquets to control bleeding on two of the most seriously injured. As additional FCSO units arrived, Frederick County Fire & Rescue personnel were cleared to come in and further treat and transport all four victims to the medical center. The scene was turned over to the Virginia State Police.

A vehicle description from witnesses, and possible registration, was broadcast along the I-81 corridor as the search for the shooter began. Later that afternoon, the suspect vehicle was located in the area of Airport Road by Sgt. S. Moore, and Sgt. C. Cunningham. An attempt to stop the vehicle was made but the suspect refused to comply, waving a firearm out the window at one point. A pursuit was initiated. Lt. W. Gosnell, one of several sheriff's deputies in the pursuit, ultimately ended the chase after using a PIT maneuver before further using his vehicle to force the suspect off the roadway, and into a ditch. Rather than be apprehended, the suspect elected to take his own life, shooting himself with the weapon used earlier. Sheriff Lenny Millholland stated "It makes me proud of the work our personnel do each day, but I must say in this incident there is no doubt that their actions saved several lives".










# 2022 NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

On 12/2/22 Frederick County Sheriff's Office Deputy's responded to a residence on Green Springs Rd. in Frederick County. This was regarding an 1800 lb. Draft horse that fell into a swimming pool. Once on the scene Deputies determined that the horse had knocked over the top rail of the fence around the pool, jumped the fence and walked out onto the nylon pool cover causing the horse to fall into the water but its head and part of the body remained above water. The Draft Horse was in the 9-foot end of the pool. Deputies Cram, ACO Deputy Tasker and Sgt. Hawse started cutting the pool cover away from the horse. 

#### **DEFINITIONS USED FOR STATISTIC COUNTS**

### **Property Crimes**

In the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. The property crime category includes arson because the offense involves the destruction of property; however, arson victims may be subjected to force.

#### Sex offenses

Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Incest, indecent exposure, and statutory rape are included. Attempts, battery and child sex crimes are included.

#### Forcible rape

The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

#### **Violent Crimes**

Violent crime is composed of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. According to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Proram's definition, violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

### **Drug Abuse Violations**

The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The following drug categories are specified: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics?manufactured narcotics that can cause true addiction (demerol, methadone); and dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

**Driving under the influence** Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

**Liquor laws** The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. Federal violations are excluded.

**Drunkenness** To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Driving under the influence is excluded.
