PROPOSED MOTIONS FOR ANNUAL REORGANIZATION

ADOPTION OF RULES OF PROCEDURE

I move that the Board of Supervisors adopt the Rules of Procedure Frederick County Board of Supervisors, adopted May 28, 2003, amended September 14, 2011 and Robert's Rules of Order Simplified and Applied.

SELECTION OF A PARLIAMENTARIAN

I move that the Board of Supervisors elect the county administrator as Parliamentarian.

SELECTION OF A TIME AND PLACE FOR REGULAR MEETINGS

I move that the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month, at 7:00 P.M., in the Board of Supervisors' Meeting Room, County Administration Building, 107 North Kent Street, Winchester, Virginia be the time and meeting place for the Frederick County Board of Supervisors for 2017. Should the meeting be cancelled due to inclement weather, then it will take place on the following evening.

RULES OF PROCEDURE FREDERICK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Adopted by the Frederick County Board of Supervisors at a Regular Meeting Held on May 28, 2003

ARTICLE I - MEETINGS

Section 1-1. Annual Meeting; Schedule of Regular Meetings

On the second Wednesday of January of each year, or on such other date in the month of January as it may designate, the Board shall assemble in the Board of Supervisors' Meeting Room of the County Administration Building, 107 North Kent Street, Winchester, Virginia, or such other public place as it may designate, in regular session and conduct its annual or organizational meeting. During the course of such meeting, the Board shall fix the date, time, and place of all of its regular meetings during the ensuing calendar year, and shall fix the day on which a regular meeting shall be continued should the Chairman later declare that weather or other conditions make it hazardous for members to attend. Thereafter, no changes shall be made to the schedule of regular meetings and continued dates of same unless the requirements of Section 15.2-1416 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended, are first met.

Section 1-2. Special Meetings

The Board of Supervisors may hold such special meetings as it deems necessary and at such times and places as it may find convenient. A special meeting can only be called pursuant to the requirements imposed by Sections 15.2-1417 and 15.2-1418 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Section 1-3. Continued Meetings

Upon majority vote of the members attending, the Board may continue its meetings, regular or special, from time to time as it may find convenient or necessary with no requirement to further advertise or announce.

Section 1-4. Quorum and Method of Voting

At any meeting, a majority of the Supervisors shall constitute a quorum. All questions submitted to the Board for decision shall be determined by a majority vote of the Supervisors present and voting on any such question, unless otherwise provided by law or these Rules of Procedure. The name of each member voting and how he or she voted will be recorded for each action taken by the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors has elected not to have a tiebreaker, as provided for by the Code

of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Section 1-5. Motions

Subject to limitations imposed hereafter in these rules, discussion of items on the agenda shall be permitted for purposes of clarifying the issues and/or the options available for consideration. No call for a vote shall be allowed until a member of the Board moves a specific action with reasonable clarity and each member of the Board has thereafter had an opportunity to speak to the specific motion. Motions shall require a second. When possible, Board members making complex, multi-part, or lengthy motions are requested to provide the clerk with a written copy of the motion at the time the motion is made.

Section 1-6. Motion to Adjourn

At a meeting of the Board, a motion to adjourn shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate, provided each member of the Board is given a reasonable opportunity to be heard.

Section 1-7. Motions While a Question is Under Debate

When a motion is under debate at a meeting of the Board, no motion shall be received unless it is one to amend, to refer to committee, for the previous question, for a substitute motion to lay on the table, or to recess or adjourn.

Section 1-8. Reconsideration of Motions, Etc., Upon Which Vote Has Been Announced

At any meeting of the Board, when any vote upon any motion, resolution, ordinance, or question has been previously announced, it may not be reconsidered unless and until a motion to that effect is presented by a member of the Board who previously voted with the prevailing side when such motion, resolution, ordinance, or question was considered. Any such motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present at the time such motion to reconsider is presented.

Section 1-9. Robert's Rules of Order; Suspending Rules [Amended 09/14/11]

The proceedings of the Board of Supervisors, except as otherwise provided in these rules and by applicable State law, shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, Simplified and Applied, with the exception of motions to postpone. Motions to postpone shall be for durations as decided by the Board of Supervisors and in conformity with the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as

amended, as applicable.

These Rules of Procedure of the Board may only be suspended on presentation of a motion to that effect, which is carried by majority vote of the members present and voting.

Section 1-10. Board to Sit with Open Doors

The Board of Supervisors shall sit with open doors, and all persons conducting themselves in an orderly manner may attend the meetings. However, the Board may hold closed meetings as permitted by law.

Closed meetings may be placed on the agenda, or may be requested by any member of the Board. However, no closed meeting shall be convened unless and until the Board has favorably acted on a motion to so convene, and then, only if such motion accurately states a lawful reason for such closed meeting as permitted by and outlined in Section 2.2-3711 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Section 1-11. Limitations on Duration and Hour of Meetings; Adjournment

Meetings of the Board of Supervisors shall not continue for more than 4 consecutive hours or later than 11:00 P.M. without the consent of a majority of the members present. Should it appear to the Chair that the matter or matters before the Board cannot be heard within the time remaining, the Chair shall poll the members of the Board to determine the desire of the members. The Chair shall adjourn or recess the meeting upon final action on the current agenda item unless a majority of the members agree to exceed the limits established by this section. Any items not taken up by the Board of Supervisors prior to adjourning will be added to the agenda of the next meeting without further action of the Board.

ARTICLE II - OFFICERS

Section 2-1. Chairman and Vice Chairman [Amended 01/14/09]

At the annual or organizational meeting of the Board of Supervisors, as described in Section 1-1 hereof, the Board shall elect from its membership a Vice Chair, who shall serve for a one year term expiring on December 31st of the same year in which he or she is elected; provided, however, that unless the term of office has expired and the member has not been re-elected, the Vice Chair shall serve until their respective successor(s) shall have been elected and qualify. In the event that the Chair is absent from any meeting, the Vice Chair shall assume the authority and duties of the Chair. In the event the Chair and Vice Chair are absent from any meeting of the Board, then the members present at such meeting shall choose one of their number as temporary

Chair by majority vote of the members present and voting.

Section 2-2. Authority of the Chairman

The efficient and dignified conduct of public business is the ultimate concern of the Board. Accordingly, it is the policy of the Board that its meetings be conducted with the highest degree of order and decorum, and the Board will permit no behavior, which is not in keeping with this policy.

The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum at all meetings. He shall recognize persons desiring to speak and shall ensure that speaker's comments are limited to the issue before the Board for consideration and that any limitations on time are observed. The Chairman shall ensure that all persons entitled and desiring to speak are permitted to do so without interruption or comment during their presentation. The Chair shall determine if statements are demeaning, inappropriate, or out of order, and shall have the authority to revoke the speaker's right to continue.

The Chairman may order the expulsion of any person for violation of rules, disruptive behavior, or any words or action that incite violence or disorder, subject to appeal to the Board. Any person so expelled shall not be readmitted for the remainder of the meeting from which he was expelled. Any person who has been so expelled and who at a later meeting again engages in words or actions justifying expulsion may be barred from attendance at future meetings of the Board for a specified and reasonable period of time not to exceed six months or upon a still subsequent expulsion, a period not to exceed one year, either by the Chairman, subject to appeal to the Board, or by motion passed by the Board.

The Chairman shall have the power to administer an oath of honesty to any person concerning any matter submitted to the Board or connected with its powers and duties. The power to administer an oath granted to the Chair in this section shall be no greater than the same power authorized by Section 15.2-1410 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended.

Section 2-3. Clerk

The Clerk of the Board shall be the County Administrator, and the duties and responsibilities of that position shall be as specified in Sections 15.2-407 and 15.2-1539 of the *Code of Virginia*, 1950, as amended. At the discretion of the Board, any county employee can be designated as Deputy Clerk, or Temporary Clerk, as the circumstances may require, and said employee shall have the same powers and duties outlined herein for the duration of said appointment.

ARTICLE III - AGENDA

Section 3-1. Preparation

The Clerk shall prepare an agenda for each meeting of the Board of Supervisors, conforming to the order of business specified in Section 4-1 under Order of Business. Supporting information for every item to be placed on the regular meeting agenda shall be received in the Office of the County Administrator before noon on the Thursday that falls in the week immediately prior to the regularly scheduled Board meeting. Agendas for special meetings shall be prepared as far in advance as the circumstances necessitating the special meeting allow. The clerk shall include on the agenda all matters for which a written request and supporting information have been received in advance of the deadline herein established.

Section 3-2. Delivery

Each member of the Board shall receive the regular meeting agenda, along with the supporting information available to staff, on the Friday of the week prior to the regular meeting to be held on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. Special meeting agendas and supporting information will be delivered as far in advance as the circumstances necessitating the special meeting allow.

Section 3-3. Posting and Notice

A copy of the meeting agendas shall be made available in the Office of the County Administrator, as of the date and time the information is distributed to members of the Board. Agendas will also be posted on the county web page at www.frederickcountyva.gov, both outside entrances to the Board of Supervisors' meeting room, the main interior doors to the meeting room, and outside the County Administrator's office.

Section 3-4. Copies

The Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the Board shall prepare or cause to be prepared extra copies of the agenda and supporting information and shall make the same available to the Handley Regional Library located at Braddock and Piccadilly Streets, Winchester, Virginia, and the Bowman Library located at 871 Tasker Road, Stephens City, Virginia at the same time the agenda is posted pursuant to Section 3-3, above. Individuals desiring complete copies of agenda packages shall arrange with the Clerk for the delivery and cost of the information desired. The Clerk or Deputy Clerk shall also have a copy of agenda packets available at each meeting.

ARTICLE IV - CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

Section 4-2. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda presented for adoption shall be the agenda prepared and delivered as required in Article III. Additions, deletions, or modifications and/or adoption of the agenda shall require the consent of a majority of the members of the Board present at the meeting.

Section 4-3. Consent Agenda

The Consent Agenda shall be introduced by a motion "to approve the Consent Agenda", and shall be considered by the Board as a single item. There shall be no debate or discussion by any member of the Board regarding any item on the Consent Agenda, beyond asking questions for simple clarification.

On objection by any member of the Board of Supervisors to inclusion of any item on the Consent Agenda, that item shall be removed from the Consent Agenda forthwith. Such objection may be recorded at any time prior to completing the taking of a vote on the motion to approve the

Consent Agenda. Items which have been objected to and removed from the Consent Agenda shall be acted upon in the original order presented within the agenda.

Approval of the motion to approve the Consent Agenda shall constitute approval, adoption, or enactment of each motion, resolution, or other item of business thereon, exactly as if each had been acted upon individually.

Section 4-4. Citizen Comments Period [Amended 4/14/04]

Two Citizen Comments periods shall be furnished during every regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors. The first Citizen Comments period shall occur after the adoption of the Consent Agenda and shall be a time for citizens to address agenda items that are not scheduled for public hearing. A register for persons desiring to address the Board of Supervisors during this Citizen Comments period shall be furnished prior to the beginning of every regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors. Citizens desiring to address the Board of Supervisors during this period shall provide their name, the issue they want to address, and their place of residence on the register provided.

The second Citizens Comments period shall occur prior to the Board of Supervisors Comments at the end of the meeting and shall be a time for citizens to address the Board of Supervisors on issues that are not part of the regular meeting agenda. Citizens desiring to address the Board of Supervisors during this period are not required to register; however, each shall state their name and their place of residence prior to their comments.

Each speaker during the Citizen Comments periods shall be limited to one appearance per citizen comment period per meeting. Individuals speaking during the Citizen Comments periods shall be subject to a three minute time limitation.

Any person desiring to address the Board of Supervisors during the Citizen Comments periods shall be required to abide by the rules governing such presentations as set forth in these rules in Article VI-Citizen Responsibilities.

Members of the Board shall neither engage in debate with, nor shall they be expected to answer questions posed by individuals speaking during the Citizen Comment period.

Section 4-5. Scheduled Presentations

Any person desiring to address the Board of Supervisors for a presentation under County Officials shall be required to abide by the rules governing such presentations as set forth in these rules in Article VI-Citizen Responsibilities.

Any citizen or staff member who desires to address the Board during the County Officials portion of the agenda at a regular meeting shall submit a written request to the Clerk, or his/her designee, identifying, with reasonable certainty, the subject matter of the presentation. Such request must be in the Clerk's hands not later than the agenda deadline specified in Section 3-1 hereof. Only the person requesting to make the presentation may do so, unless otherwise permitted by the Chair, and every such speaker shall be subject to a five minute time limit for the presentation itself, which limit can be extended with agreement of the Chairman. Board member questions and discussion of the material presented shall not be subject to any time limit. Persons making presentations should be prepared to answer questions and provide detailed information in response to questions from members of the Board.

ARTICLE V - PUBLIC HEARINGS

Section 5-1. Format for Public Hearings

It is the purpose and objective of the Board of Supervisors to give each citizen an opportunity to express his/her views on the issue(s) at hand at public hearings and to give all speakers equal treatment and courtesy. While it is often necessary to have a presentation by an applicant and staff, it is the desire of the Board to hear from the public; and therefore, the applicant and staff presentations will be as brief as possible. In order to accomplish this objective it is necessary that certain rules of order prevail at all public hearings of the Board of Supervisors as follows:

Section 5-2. Order of Business

At public hearings, the order of business will be as follows:

- (a) Identification of Issue and Verification of Notice
- (b) Staff and/or Applicant Presentation
- (c) Public Comment
- (d) Close of Public Hearing
- (e) Board Member Questions
- (<u>f</u>) Staff, Applicant Response
- (g) Board discussion and/or consideration

Section 5-3. Identification of Issue and Verification of Required Notice

The Chair shall call upon the appropriate county staff member to verify that any required notice has been given and to read or summarize the notice for the benefit of those attending the

public hearing.

Section 5-4. Staff and/or Applicant Presentation

The Chair will call upon the appropriate county staff and/or applicant to present such information as is necessary to explain the action requested of the Board of Supervisors. Presentations will be brief, concise summaries for the Supervisor's and the public's information and understanding, provided that sufficient time will be allowed to present, properly and fairly, the subject matter. When written information has been provided prior to the hearing, that information should be summarized and only new information should be presented in detail at the meeting.

Section 5-5. Public Comment

Any person desiring to address the Board of Supervisors at a Public Hearing conducted by the Board of Supervisors shall be required to abide by the rules governing such presentations as set forth in these rules in Article VI-Citizen Responsibilities.

Prior to permitting public comment, the Chair shall determine, to the best of his ability, the approximate number of persons desiring to comment at the public hearing and shall establish the manner in which speakers are recognized and the length of time each may speak.

Should the Chair determine that the likely number of persons desiring to speak is 10 or more in number, he may direct that individuals desiring to speak register with staff, providing their name and the district in which they reside. Should registration be required, the Chair shall verify that all such registration has been completed before the hearings begin.

Section 5-6. Order of Speaking

Members of the public shall be permitted to speak as the Chair recognizes each, provided that no member of the public shall be recognized to speak a second time until all persons desiring to speak have had an opportunity to do so. In the event the number of persons desiring to speak necessitates a register, speakers shall be recognized in the order in which they have registered.

In the event the number of speakers results in the continuation of a public hearing, any persons registered but not heard at the initial Public Hearing will be the first given an opportunity to speak at the continued hearing.

Section 5-7. Presentation of Comments

Each person may address the Board as many times as the Chair, in his or her discretion,

may allow, but no speaker shall exceed the total time limit set by the Chair.

Section 5-8. Board Members' Questions

Upon completion of a presentation by staff, applicant or member of the public, any member of the Board may ask questions to enhance their understanding of the issue, verify information presented or clarify the action or actions requested. Members of the Board shall not engage in debate with the person or persons making the presentation.

Section 5-9. Staff and/or Applicant Response

The Chairman shall call on the staff or applicant for any response on closing comments with reference to the public hearing presentations.

Section 5-10. Close of Hearing

When the Chair of the Board shall have closed a public hearing, no further public comments shall be received.

Section 5-11. Board Discussions and/or Consideration

At the close of the public hearing, the Board of Supervisors shall, at its discretion, act or defer action upon the matter set for public hearing. In the event the Board defers action to a later date, the record shall be left open to receive written comments up until the time that a vote is taken.

ARTICLE VI - CITIZEN RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 6-1. Application of Rules

Any person desiring to address the Board of Supervisors during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall be required to abide by the rules governing such presentations as hereafter set forth in these rules.

Section 6-2. Addressing the Board

All persons speaking at a meeting of the Board during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall address their comments to the Board of Supervisors and shall limit their comments to matters before the Board of Supervisors. Speakers shall not engage in debate with other speakers or members of the public. Questions shall not be asked of other speakers, but may be directed to the Chairman of the Board for consideration by the Board in later deliberating the matter.

Section 6-3. Conduct while Speaking/Conduct While Not Speaking

Persons speaking at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors shall do so in a courteous manner. Cursing or other obscene language or gestures, threats, insults, or other actions intended to harass, provoke or incite a fight, brawl, or other such disorderly response will not be permitted. Any person whose conduct is contrary to this section will be removed as provided for in section 2-2 of these rules. Board members are expected to observe the same decorum at all meetings.

Section 6-4. Name and Place of Residence

Individuals addressing the Board during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall clearly state their name and place of residence prior to making any further comments. Should a person be recognized to speak more than once, they shall identify themselves each time before speaking.

Section 6-5. Organizational Representation

Any person speaking at any portion of a meeting designated for public comment, who represents himself as being an officer or representative of an organization, group, association, corporation, or other entity, shall, upon request of a member of the Board, disclose for the organization, group, association, corporation, or other entity, the history, size, dues, structure, date of creation, requirements for membership, tax status; and shall reveal the organizations method of determining its official position and the speaker's authority to represent the organization. Unreasonable failure to provide this information to the satisfaction of the Board of Supervisors shall bar the speaker from speaking on behalf of the organization.

Section 6-6. Order of Speaking

Persons speaking during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall do so in the order in which they are recognized and called upon by the Chair.

Section 6-7. Time Limits

All persons speaking during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall observe all time limits established herein and shall yield the floor when informed their time has expired.

Section 6-8. Registration

Should registration of speakers be required, all persons desiring to speak shall sign the register, providing their name, place of residence and district.

Section 6-9. Written Copy of Comments

Speakers are requested, but not required, to leave written statements and/or comments with the Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the Board to be incorporated into the written record of the meeting.

Section 6-10. Information Sources

No person who speaks or otherwise presents information during any portion of a meeting designated for public comment shall knowingly present false or untrue information to the Board of Supervisors, and shall, upon request of any Board Member, provide the source of any information presented.

ARTICLE VII - APPOINTMENTS

Section 7-1. Appointments

The Chairman shall appoint members of the Board to such authorities, boards, commissions, committees or other organizations or positions as the Board shall so authorize and to appoint various citizen members to Board's standing committees.

Section 7.2. Committee Appointments [Amended 01/25/06]

Each board member may nominate citizen members to be appointed to the various authorities, boards, commissions, and committees where a representative is needed from a member's respective magisterial district or for the county at large. A majority vote of those board members present shall be required to appoint a nominee to said authority, board, commission, or committee. Prior to Board action on a perspective nominee, the following process shall be followed:

- 1. Applications for vacancies are available through Board members and the County Administrator's Office. A completed application shall be required for all initial nominations; however, a completed application for candidates being reappointed shall not be required.
- 2. Applications shall be received in the County Administrator's Office up to 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday preceding a Board meeting in order that they might be included in the agenda for review by the members of the Board.

3. The applications will be acknowledged at the aforesaid meeting with action on the appointment to be taken at the next regular meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS

Section 8-1. Amendments

These Rules of Procedure may from time to time be revised, repealed, or otherwise amended upon an affirmative vote by a majority of the members of the Board of Supervisors present and voting.

1. Fall Transportation Forum

The Committee discussed the responses to date from the state elected officials for the transportation forum and directed Staff to poll the Board for their availability. The Committee also discussed several items that could be key points of discussion at the meeting.

2. Welltown Road Speed Concerns

Staff began by clarifying that Mr. DeHaven had actually been contacted about Rest Church Road but noted that the system concerns remained an issue and that Welltown Road should be considered in the discussion. Staff noted that they are meeting with VDOT regarding the status of the improvements to the intersection of Welltown Road and Martinsburg Pike and also to discuss with VDOT the possibility of moving the truck restriction signs on Welltown to the north of Tyson Drive. Sheriff Milholland will be placing equipment on Rest Church Road and Welltown to gather traffic and speed data to aid the Committee in determining whether to request a formal speed study from VDOT.

3. County Projects Update

Snowden Bridge Boulevard:

Construction is underway and on schedule at this time. Completion is imminent.

Tevis Street Extension/Airport Road/I-81 Bridge:

The revenue sharing agreement has been executed and design is once again underway on the bridge. In addition, the traffic impact analysis that will determine the design specifics for the Airport Road is underway and a draft is nearly complete. Staff is having a teleconference regarding the TIA on 10/17.

Renaissance Drive:

Transportation Partnership Opportunity Fund application has been submitted which could change the project from a grade to a bridge crossing. The meeting for the consideration of the application is expected to take place shortly. Staff is coordinating with CSX and VDOT to complete an MOU for the process of getting the crossing as well as determining unimproved rail crossings for upgrade.

Valley Mill Road Realignment:

Thirty percent design has been completed and the County's on call consultant is providing an updated cost estimate to complete design through 100%. Upon approval by the private party partner, the next phase of design will begin.

Coverstone Drive:

No activity at this time.

Jubal Early Drive Extension and Interchange with Route 37:

Initial meetings regarding a draft agreement and follow up application for additional revenue sharing funds has been held with the private partner team.

4. Other

Mrs. McCann-Slaughter noted that she would be accompanying Staff to the Commonwealth Transportation Board forum that was held on October 24 at Blue Ridge Community College in Weyers Cave.

Debt Management

Introduction

One of the keys to sound financial management is the development of a debt policy. The need is included in both recommended practices by the Government Finance Officers Association and by bond rating agencies.

Key Debt Ratio Guidelines

- Tax Supported 10-year Payout Ratio should be greater than 65%. The 10-year payout ratio measures the amount of principal to be retired in 10 years.
- Debt to Assessed Value should be in a range not to exceed 0.75%-1.75%.
- Debt Service vs. Governmental Expenditures Ratio should be in a range not to exceed 8-12%. Governmental expenditures represent the ongoing operating expenditures of the County and School Board. In this calculation, debt service and capital expenditures are excluded from expenditures.



Project Narrative Frederick County Sheriff's Office Reaching out to Citizens in Frederick County

Need Statement

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office is the full service law enforcement agency for Frederick County, Virginia. Frederick County's population is approximately 83,000 people according to the 2015 census estimate. Frederick County is 415 square miles of suburban, rural, commercial, and agricultural developments, which surrounds Winchester City, the county seat. There are two incorporated towns in Frederick County, Stephens City and Middletown. Four major highways including Interstate 81 pass through Frederick County. The Frederick County Sheriff's Office responded to over 67,000 calls for service in 2015.

Frederick County like other localities has struggled with balancing its budget and still meeting the needs of the citizens. One of the unmet needs is providing more community interaction with the citizens of Frederick County via crime prevention presentations and brochures. Like other localities throughout the state and country, Frederick County is struggling to allocate needed resources because of the drug abuse (heroin) issue. The following populations need more crime prevention attention in Frederick County. The Latino community, the high school community, and the senior citizen community currently do not receive the needed attention to address their needs.

The Sheriff's Office currently attends community events throughout the county. A need that has been determined is for the proper equipment to attend these functions. The Sheriff's Office needs new tables and chairs to take to the functions and would like to have a nice pop up tent with our logo on the tent. The tent would help identify the Frederick County Sheriff's Office as being a participant in the function. Currently we do not have a way to identify the Sheriff's Office as a participant.

The Latino population is increasing in Frederick County, but it is an underserved population. Frederick County Sheriff's Office has not had the funds to do outreach programs in the Latino community. The Sheriff's Office would like to be able to reach out to this underserved community and offer them the same crime prevention information we offer to the English speaking population. This would be the foundation to establish a trusting relationship between the Latino community and the Sheriff's Office.

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office currently has School Resource Officers in 3 high schools and 4 middle schools in Frederick County. We also have a D.A.R.E. officer that teaches the program in the 11 elementary schools. The School Resource Officers teach Virginia rules in the high schools; however, we do not have any brochures to hand out to the students. Another issue is the amount of mental health issues that have been reported to School Resource Officers. Frederick County Public Schools averages 4 deaths per year from suicide and traffic accidents. The Sheriff's Office would like to provide information to students on current crimes, mental health, and driving safely.

Another community service the Frederick County Sheriff's Office provides is sponsoring an Explorer Program. This program allows young people between the ages of 14 and 21 to explore a career in law enforcement. They meet twice a month and do training similar to the basic law enforcement academy. The requested funding for this program will allow the Sheriff's Office to purchase new uniforms for the Explorers, which will help identify them when they are doing community events for the Sheriff's Office. This exposure helps recruit other Explorers and their interaction with other people their age creates a positive perception of the Sheriff's Office.

The senior population is also growing in Frederick County. We have two large senior residential communities in Frederick County that accept residents continually. There are also numerous senior

residents who live alone in the county in their own residence. Additionally, law enforcement agencies in Virginia have been tasked with search and rescue. The Sheriff's Office has seen an increase in calls for search and rescue resources, including missing senior citizens. Frederick County Sheriff's Office currently has Project Lifesaver, but we do not have enough band kits to meet the demand, especially for lower income seniors and families with autistic children.

Everyone knows that equipment can malfunction or fail at the most inopportune time. Two receivers are the minimum needed to do a good search for a missing person with a Project Lifesaver transmitter. Three receivers would ensure that at least two are working or three would allow more territory to be covered locating the missing person faster. This is always crucial in inclement weather when location time could mean life or death to the missing child or senior citizen.

In January 2016 the Sheriff's Office started our own program to assist senior citizens in Frederick County with quality of life issues, including crime prevention. We have put on several seminars on scams, senior abuse, and medical awareness. These seminars have been attended consistently by approximately 30 senior citizens. The Sheriff's Office also participates in the Triad/Salt program where we also reach out to senior citizens within the Frederick County/Clarke County/Winchester City community. We also provide speakers and brochures for these events.

Another issue that the Sheriff's Office has experience is gaining entry into senior citizens residence to check their welfare. We received 709 "Check the Welfare" calls for service in 2015. Approximately half of these calls were for senior citizens. On most of these calls the deputies have difficulty gaining entrance into the residence to check on the resident. Numerous times deputies will have to force entry into the residence to check on the person because they live alone. Providing lockboxes to the senior citizens who live alone and cannot afford one will help us better serve this segment of our population.

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office has the I2 program, but does not have a trained analyst to operate this program. The I2 program is a program that allows the operator to track different types of crimes or events. This would be useful in determining the correct response to criminal incidents, arrest data, traffic stops, or use of force issues.

In conclusion, the Frederick County Sheriff's Office believes there is a need to provide additional services to the underserved Latino community, the high school community and the senior citizen community in Frederick County. The funds from this grant would be used to further educate and assist these underserved populations while building a trusting relationship.

Project Description

Latino Community Outreach

The Sheriff's Office will purchase the brochures written in Spanish and actively seek times to interact with the Latino community. We do have several areas in the county where there is a high concentration of Latinos residing. We plan to do some community events in those areas. The tables, chairs, and tent would be used to set up an area where we could distribute the brochures and interact with the community. We believe that reaching out to the Latino community will facilitate the development of a trusting relationship that will encourage the community to engage in crime prevention within their community. The I2 program would be used to provide relevant information to the Latino community about crime trends and other issues.

High School Community Outreach

The Sheriff's Office would like to provide information to students on current crimes, mental health, and safe driving. The brochures would be distributed to students at schools throughout the county to reinforce what they were taught by the School Resource Officers. The brochures would be given out in the spring and fall of 2017 to the students. The brochures would not be given to the same class both

times so as to reach more students.

The uniforms for the Explorers would be purchased and issued to them immediately. Most of our Explorers are high school students and interact with other students daily. We would also allow them to speak at community events about our program.

Senior Citizen Community Outreach

The Frederick County Sheriff's Office will purchase brochures and medical information cards and distribute them at community function, seminars, and events as soon as they are received. They will also be distributed at the two annual Triad/Salt events.

The lockboxes will also be installed at residences where a need to have one has been identified. This will immediately allow access to senior citizen residences where the senior live alone. This will help alleviate one of the biggest concerns voiced by senior citizens living alone; no one will be able to get into their residence to help them in a time of need.

The Project Lifesaver receiver and transmitters will be ordered and the transmitters will be allocated as needed to people who suffer from Alzheimer's and Autism who ae considered fight risks. This equipment is also used in Search and Rescue training were we have a deputy take a transmitter and wander off in the woods or a residential area and the team locates the missing deputy.

Project Timeline

The Sheriff's Office will begin using the requested funds immediately upon receiving the funds to purchase the requested equipment and supplies. Once the equipment and supplies are purchased then the Sheriff's Office will start attending more community events and will host at least one community event for the Latino community in Frederick County. All funds will be expended by December 31, 2017.

Currently the Sheriff's Office has a monthly seminar for senior citizens on current issues. The purchased brochures would be handed out at these meetings. Also Triad/Salt has a spring and fall event where the brochures could be given out to seniors. The new tables, chairs and tent would be used at all of these functions.

The Sheriff's Office will purchase the lockboxes and identify needy senior citizens that need a lockbox installed on their residence. Once identified the lockbox will be installed and the combination will be placed in our CAD system so that the Sheriff's Office or Fire and Rescue can enter the residence whenever a emergency occurs or the person's welfare needs to be checked.

The School Resource Officers interact with the students daily and participate in teaching and events at their assigned school continuously. Once the brochures are purchased they can be given out during these interactions with the students to supplement the message that was just taught.

There are several I2 training classes scheduled for 2017. The crime analyst would enroll in one of these scheduled classes to receive the training in the use of this program.

Reaching Out to Citizens in Frederick County Budget Narrative

- 3. Greg Lambert-Project Lifesaver. (\$681.00)

These three people already perform duties related to the above mentioned programs and the purchased supplies and equipment will enhance their ability to reach out to more citizens of Frederick County.

- The project Lifesaver band kit will allow us to sign up 10 more flight risk individuals to the Project Lifesaver program. (\$3500.00)
- We would like to purchase another PL1-5000 receiver from Project Lifesaver to track missing individuals. We currently have 2 receivers now, but a third one will allow us to cover more area, thus locating the missing person faster. (\$1800.00)
- The exterior lockbox program will allow us to place a spare house key in an exterior lockbox of a senior citizen that resides alone. This will allow the Sheriff's Office and Fire and Rescue to enter the residence in emergency cases without damaging doors or windows to gain entry. (\$2000.00)
- The Explorer program is a visible part of the Sheriff's Office at different events.
 Purchasing uniforms for the Explorers will promote unity within the program and attract new recruits for the program. The Explorer program provides positive interaction with the Sheriff's Office and young adults. The uniforms would be pants, shirts, belts, and boots. (\$2000.00)
- Purchasing a tent and tables and chairs will allow the Sheriff's Office to provide a better environment when we attend different community functions. The tent will provide protection from the sun and rain. The tables and chairs will allow us more space to do fingerprinting and provide crime prevention literature to the community. (\$500.00)







A meeting of the Public Safety Committee was held on Wednesday December 14, 2016 at 8:30 a.m. at the Frederick County Public Safety Building, 1080 Coverstone Drive, Winchester, VA. Committee members present were: Committee Chairman Gene Fisher, Gary Lofton, Walter Cunningham, Chuck Torpy and Helen Lake. Member Blaine Dunn was not present. Also in attendance were Assistant County Attorney Erin Swisshelm, Fire & Rescue Chief Denny Linaburg, Major Steve Hawkins, Communications Director LeeAnna Pyles, Deputy County Administrator for Human Services Jay Tibbs, Deputy Fire Chief Larry Oliver, and Sheriff Lenny Millholland. The following items were discussed:

Discussion Items

1. Departmental budget increases for FY18:

Sheriff Millholland stated that his departments significant FY18 budget increase of \$2.9 million dollars would be allotted for vehicle replacement and new personnel. In his submission, his department is looking to obtain approximately 25 cars per year to replace the existing fleet of 140 cars which currently have high mileage and maintenance costs in addition to hiring and training 12 new deputies.

Director LeeAnna Pyles has requested a \$63,000 increase for her departments FY18 budget submission. This would go to upgrade the dispatch centers current phone system in order to receive Text to 9-1-1. This is starting to become the "norm" at dispatch centers, where citizens have the ability to text in an emergency if their situation warrants. Given that Interstate 81 runs through the county and our proximity to Interstate 66, both major transportations routes, the Director would like Frederick County to have this feature available. She noted that some other localities along the I-81 corridor in our region are planning to implement this technology as well.

Chief Linaburg presented his departments FY18 budge increase request of \$6.3 million dollars to

the Committee. As in years past, personnel and training are a large part of his budget request. He is requesting for funding of 29 additional personnel. Clothing, vehicle replacements, radios and gear are factored into the increase as well. Chief Linaburg emphasized that the self-contained breathing apparatus' are coming to the "end of life" and need to be replaced. This is a vital piece of equipment for fire fighters. He advised that his office has applied for a grant that would offset some of the cost (up to \$1 million dollars) of the estimated \$3 million dollar cost. It will be spring of 2017 before there will be any announcement of the grant award.

2. RFP study update:

Chief Linaburg updated the Committee on the status of the Fire & Rescue Study. He advised that a committee had been established and a Request for Proposal was prepared and advertised with a number of firms responding to the FRP. He went on to say that a sub-committee has been meeting to review the proposals and they have narrowed the interview list down to 4, including PSSI, CPSM, Fitch and ESCI. Interviews will be held on Tuesday, December 20, 2016.

3. Other Business:

Helen Lake inquired about the dropping of radio signals out in the field. Director Pyles stated we are in the process of upgrading the Sheriff's Office radios which will cost between \$25,000-\$30,000. It was reiterated that there are "dead" spots within the County and we are working on minimizing the issue. Major Hawkins added that his office has obtained new radios at no cost however they need batteries, antennas and programming. Fire & Rescue's Fred Kinder and Captain Karl Steudl, who is retiring at the end of January, have been working in tandem to reprogram these radios. The both of them have extensive knowledge of our radio system and it keeps the cost to a minimum. By week's end, the Sheriff's Office will test 10 of these new radios in the field.

The Transportation Committee met on December 19, 2016 at 8:30 a.m.

1. Capital Improvement Plan Update

Staff presented last year's Capital Improvement Plan to the Committee and noted the individual projects that are identified, as well as the balance of the Eastern Road Plan. Staff recommended that additional projects that have been called out individually in the draft update of the Eastern Road Plan should likewise be individually noted in the Capital Improvement Plan. Staff also noted that this recommendation is contingent upon what format the Board of Supervisors chooses to adopt for the Capital Improvement Plan.

The Committee reviewed and endorsed the Staff recommendation by consensus.

2. Gainesboro School Transportation

Mr. Wayne Lee of the Frederick County Public School System was present to update the Committee on the transportation at the Gainesboro School on Route 522 North. Previously the Committee had requested more information on an alternative route to Route 522 via Gainesboro Road. Mr. Lee noted that one of the issues with Gainesboro Road is that the crossover of Route 522 is not wide enough to hold a bus.

Mr. Oates asked about the possibility of shifting the southbound lanes of Route 522 to allow for a wider median and noted that there appears to be right-of-way available. Mr. Lee stated that this had not been considered.

Mr. Fisher asked whether (other issues aside) a stop light would allow vehicles to exit the facility and head North on Route 522. The answer was yes, but additional safety concerns were noted.

Mr. Tierney noted that the sight distance at the existing entrance cannot be fixed and that the only real long term solution is to get the traffic to Gainesboro Road.

Staff asked whether a signal warrant had been completed for Gainesboro Road at Route 522 that took into consideration school traffic using Gainesboro Road. It had not.

Mr. Fisher reiterated that warning lights are necessary such as those used on Route 460 in Bedford County.

Mr. Racey asked how many buses would not have to access Route 522 at all if the school traffic was sent to Gainesboro Road. While the exact number was not available the estimate was 10-15.

A number of individuals discussed the possibility of keeping the existing entrance to the school as a right in/right out access.

The consensus of the Committee was to continue looking into the possibility of getting school traffic an entrance onto Gainesboro Road, changing the existing access point for the schools to a right in/right out entrance, extending the left turn lane of Route 522 at Gainesboro Road and evaluate a signal at Gainesboro and Route 522.

Mr. Fisher noted his hope that the traffic issues for the 12th elementary school will be addressed prior to construction. Mr. Lee noted that the school division is working hard on that and is currently having discussions with Shockey for additional access. Mr. Lee noted that ultimately two-thirds of the student population in the 12th elementary school is expected to be from the Snowden Bridge Development.

Mr. Oates noted that this discussion highlights the need to look at infrastructure when schools are planned.

3. Transportation Forum Report

Staff provided the feedback received from the Transportation Forum to the Committee as well as photos from the event (attached). Staff also noted that there was a great turnout and that they had received numerous compliments on the event.

4. County Projects Update

Snowden Bridge Boulevard:

Final items are being addressed as this project wraps up.

Tevis Street Extension/Airport Road/I-81 Bridge:

Bridge design is ongoing and environmental documents for VDOT are being completed. Bridge design has reached 75%, but comments are pending from VDOT on earlier submissions

Renaissance Drive:

Currently working with CSX on MOU for the future crossing. The County's Transportation Partnership Opportunity Fund application has been recommended for approval by the Governor's Advisory Committee and agreements are expected shortly.

Valley Mill Road Realignment:

Thirty percent design has been completed and the County's on call consultant is providing an updated cost estimate to complete design through 100%. Upon approval by the private party partner, the next phase of design will begin.

Coverstone Drive:

No activity at this time.

Jubal Early Drive Extension and Interchange with Route 37:

Initial meetings regarding a draft agreement and follow up application for additional revenue sharing funds has been held with the private partner team.

CALL TO ORDER

Assistant Director Transportation, John A. Bishop welcomed everyone and requested introduction of the panel of individuals at the dais which included: Judith McCann-Slaughter; Gary Lofton, Dave LaRock, Bob Wells, Randy Minchew, Dixon Whitworth, Chris Collins, Cliff Balderson, Randy Kiser, Gene Fisher, Charles DeHaven, and Blaine Dunn.

OPEN FORUM DISCUSSION

Citizens were encouraged to come forward to discuss any transportation related items and voice their concerns. A gentleman spoke in regards to public transit to and from LFCC and the long length trips. Delegate Chris Collins noted there is a Committee being put together to address the situations with public transportation to LFCC.

In regards to the unpaved Laurel Grove Road, there were nine (9) citizens that came forward with their concerns and comments. The concerns were relatively consistent with one another to include: safety of the road due to lack of visibility with all the dust, pot holes, washboard areas, loose gravel. The citizens

expressed the need for a more permanent solution to the repairs rather than simple grading of the road with does not last. A citizen noted the safety concerns for the school buses that travel this road on a daily basis. Another citizen noted that other roads such as Carter Lane and Pack Horse Road have been moved up on the list but Laurel Grove remains the same, going nowhere. Edinburg VDOT Residency Administrator, Cliff Balderson addressed the citizens' concerns. Mr. Balderson explained it is no secret Laurel Grove Road is in desperate need of repair. He noted last year he made a commitment to make improvements to this road and by the reactions it does not appear to be up to par. Mr. Balderson continued until the funds are available more drastic improvements cannot be made unless Frederick County approves to move Laurel Grove Road up on the list for paving. He explained there is the need for non-hard surface secondary road improvements funds and this continues to be a work in progress. Staunton District Engineer, Randy Kiser noted there is more money being put into unpaved road dollars and this is a positive thing and ordinary maintenance is keeping old roads in good shape.

A citizen commended the hard work that has been put into this meeting. He lives in the vicinity of Welltown Road and expressed his concern of the growing traffic issues in this area. He suggested opening Welltown Road to truck traffic. Randy Kiser commented the Route 11 and Welltown Road projects are due to get underway in the spring.

A citizen came forward with concerns regarding the heavy traffic on Greenwood Road. He explained the Sulphur Springs Road and Greenwood Road intersection is a hazard and there is on average one accident a week on Greenwood Road. Delegate Randy Minchew inquired if Greenwood and Sulphur Spring Roads are on the list for repair. Cliff Balderson noted it is in the mix to restructure Sulphur Springs Road which will in turn alleviate some of the concerns on Greenwood Road.

Two citizens voiced their ongoing concerns with the traffic situation in Oakdale Crossing. These concerns continue to be: large volume of traffic daily; no sidewalks; passage way between Route 50 and Senseny Road; roughly 4,300 trips per day thru this subdivision; need for a traffic signal.

A citizen raised concerns with the increased traffic on North Hayfield Road. She noted this has become a connector between Route 50 and Route 522.

Another citizen came forward regarding concerns with the high volume of traffic on I-81. He noted another concern is the difficulty getting in and out of Opequon Church Lane. He concluded by complimenting the work at Exit 310.

Delegate Chris Collins thanked everyone for coming and for providing comments. He commented roads tend to be on everyone's radar and this discussion this evening is appreciated.

Delegate Randy Minchew inquired are there any plans for other connections between Route 50 and Senseny Road. Chairman DeHaven noted Channing Drive is the only connector. Assistant County Administrator, Kris Tierney explained Inverle has been in the minds for years however the landowner has no interest in dedicating the right-of-way. Supervisor Fisher commented he feels the traffic calming measures will be helpful in Oakdale Crossing. Mr. Fisher continued if Sulphur Springs Road and Greenwood Road are improved then Oakdale Crossing should see improvements also.

John Bishop offered an update on the traffic calming study; the Board of Supervisors has requested a traffic calming study through VDOT with one of the requirements being Frederick County provides count data which has been contracted through the MPO and Mr. Bishop expects these counts to take place very soon. In addition to these counts they are also using camera stations at Route 50 entrances to establish a good number of how much cut through traffic we're dealing with.

Supervisor Wells feels the roads being discussed from a safety stand point are legitimately unsafe and maybe the list can be adjusted.

Staunton District Representative of the Commonwealth Transportation Board, F. Dixon Whitworth Jr., presented a brief overview of Smart Scale. Mr. Whitworth explained in 2015 legislature passed a comprehensive transportation funding bill which put a new perspective on how transportation is funded; this went concurrent with a HB2 bill which says there must be some sort of prioritization which is devised and publically aware with which projects within our state for transportation are given a waiting of priority. The HB2 prioritization has evolved into what is referred to as Smart Scale. He continued the projects that are being submitted are scored and then prioritized within Districts and within the State. Mr. Whitworth noted there are currently 436 applications and Frederick County has nine (9) of those applications.

Chairman DeHaven asked for additional comments and thanked everyone for coming.

A citizen spoke regarding Carter Lane and the safety concerns. She noted the road traffic has increased and speed is always a factor. She concluded she would like to see Route 37 continued.







- Improving awareness about NOT using cellphones while drive.













Dear Brenda:

During the Frederick County Sanitation Authority's (FCSA) monthly meeting on September 20, 2016, the FCSA Board discussed and endorsed a few minor revisions to their Articles of Incorporation. The primary revisions is intended to ensure that the Articles of Incorporation are accurate. The Board also requested that I forward the endorsed revisions to the County, and seek the County's approval of the revised Articles of Incorporation. Please accept this correspondence as the FCSA's request for County action on the revised Articles of Incorporation.

FCSA is a public body and an instrument of the Commonwealth of Virginia, organized under Virginia Water and Waste Authorities Act, being Chapter 28, Title 15.2, Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended ("the Act"). FCSA was created by action of the Board of Supervisors of Frederick County, Virginia and was chartered by the State Corporation Commission on August 1, 1967. The Board of Supervisors created FCSA Articles of Incorporation. Most importantly, as an authority, FCSA makes no profit and its operations and finances are independent of Frederick County's tax-supported services.

The original Articles of Incorporation included the names, addresses, and the appointment terms of the initial members. To this date, the Articles of Incorporation continue to reflect the names, addresses, and now expired terms of FCSA Board members who no longer have a role on the FCSA Board. The first minor revisions that FCSA seeks is the removal of member names and addresses from the actual Articles of Incorporation. Instead of names and addresses, the FCSA Board requests that the Articles of Incorporation simply state that the membership will consist of 5 members with 4-year terms that entail the replacement of a member every year. The practice of the Board of Supervisors has been to make annual appointments as terms expire; that practice will certainly continue. But removing the member

names and addresses from the Article of Incorporation enables the Articles to remain valid, removing dated and inaccurate content.

FCSA also seeks to revise the Articles of Incorporation to empower its members – the FCSA Board members- to establish their own compensation as deemed appropriate. The current Articles of Incorporation empower the Board of Supervisors to determine the appropriate compensation for the FCSA Board members. By design, FCSA makes no profit and our operations and finances are independent of Frederick County's tax-supported services. FCSA has an annual budget of nearly \$30,000,000. The FCSA Board members oversee this non-profit organization, and are accountable for its success and challenges. FCSA and its customers, not Frederick County, pay the compensation of its Board members. With this responsibility, it natural to enable the FCSA Board members to establish their own monthly compensation. It is worth noting that with the extensive responsibility, their compensation is \$200 per month; the FCSA Board has stated its intent to increase the compensation to \$300.00 per month.

In compliance with the Virginia Water and Waste Authorities Act (Chapter 51, Title 15.2, Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended), the Board of County Supervisors of Frederick County, Virginia, pursuant to an Articles of Incorporation resolution dated April 10, 1967, created the sanitation authority. The Articles of Incorporation are amended, and are restated as follows:

- (a) This Authority is formed under the Virginia Water and Waste Authorities Act, its name shall be "FREDERICK COUNTY SANITATION AUTHORITY", and the address of its principal office shall be: 315 Tasker Road, Stephens City, Virginia.
- (b) The name of the incorporating political subdivision is FREDERICK COUNTY, VIRGINIA. There shall be five (5) members the Board of Directors of the Authority, each of whom shall maintain a residence in Frederick County, Virginia. The names and addresses of the members of the Board of Directors of the Authority shall be maintained in the County Administrator's Office. The expiration of the term of office of each member is as follows:



§ 15.2-5104. Advertisement of ordinance, agreement or resolution and notice of hearing.

Right-of-Way Widths for Family Lot Subdivisions

DATE: December 30, 2016

This is a proposed amendment to Chapter 144 – Subdivision of Land, to update the minimum right-of-way requirement necessary to create a family division lot. Family division lots as small as two acres in the RA (Rural Areas) District are permitted to be divided and conveyed to an immediate family member. The subdivision ordinance currently states that a 50 foot right-of-way is required in order to subdivide these lots. However; the Code of Virginia states that a 20 foot right-of-way is the maximum that can be required. Staff has drafted a revision to the Subdivision Ordinance which reduces the current 50 foot right-of-way requirement to a 20 foot minimum right-of-way for a family division lot.

The DRRC discussed this amendment at their August 2016 meeting. The DRRC agreed with the proposed change and the item was forwarded to the Planning Commission for discussion. The Planning Commission discussed this at their October 5, 2016 meeting; the Planning Commission agreed with the change and noted that it would bring the Subdivision Ordinance into compliance with the State Code. The Board of Supervisors discussed this item on October 26, 2016; the Board of Supervisors agreed with the proposed changes and sent the amendment forward for public hearing. The Planning Commission held a public hearing for this item at their December 7, 2016 meeting; there were no citizen comments and the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the amendment.

§ 144.31. Rural subdivisions. [Amended 6-9-1993; 8-12-2009]

The requirements of this section shall apply to all subdivisions of land zoned RA (Rural Areas) under Article IV of Chapter 165, Zoning, of the Frederick County Code.

*Sections A and B remain unchanged.

- C. Minor rural subdivisions.
 - (1) The division of the following types of lots is permitted under the regulations for minor rural subdivision:
 - (a) Lots described by § 165-401.06B, Family division lots of Chapter 165, Zoning, of the Frederick County Code. [Amended 12-9-2009]
 - (b) Lots described in § 165-401.06A, Traditional five-acre lots, and § 165-401.06D, Rural preservation lots, provided that a total of no more than three such lots may be created from any one parcel under these regulations.
 - (2) Shared private driveways. Vehicular access to a minor rural subdivision may be provided by means of shared private driveways. The owners of lots provided with access via such driveways shall be responsible for the improvement and maintenance of said driveways. When shared driveways are used, the Subdivision Administrator shall be provided with copies of the deeds of transfer. Such deeds shall contain the following language:

The proposed shared private driveway is not building according to street standards and will not be maintained by the Virginia Department of Transportation or the County of Frederick. The improvement and maintenance of said driveway shall be the sole responsibility of the owners of lots which are provided with access via the driveway. Said shared private driveways will not be considered for inclusion into the state secondary system until they meet the applicable construction standards of the Virginia Department of Transportation. The cost of bringing said driveways to acceptable standards shall not be borne by the Virginia Department of Transportation nor by Frederick County.

(3) Minimum width for shared private driveway. The minimum right-of-way width for a shared private driveway shall be 50 feet to <u>a public street or right-of-way dedicated for maintenance by the Virginia Department of Transportation. For the purposes of family division lots, the minimum right-of-way width for a shared private driveway shall be 20 feet to a public street or right-of-way dedicated for maintenance by the Virginia Department of Transportation.</u>

Code of Virginia

§ 15.2-2244. Provisions for subdivision of a lot for conveyance to a family member.

A. In any county a subdivision ordinance shall provide for reasonable provisions permitting a single division of a lot or parcel for the purpose of sale or gift to a member of the immediate family of the property owner, including the family member's spouse, subject only to any express requirement contained in the Code of Virginia and to any requirement imposed by the local governing body that all lots of less than five acres have reasonable right-of-way of not less than 10 feet or more than 20 feet providing ingress and egress to a dedicated recorded public street or thoroughfare. Only one such division shall be allowed per family member, and shall not be for the purpose of circumventing this section. For the purpose of this subsection, a member of the immediate family is defined as any person who is a natural or legally defined offspring, stepchild, spouse, sibling, grandchild, grandparent, or parent of the owner. In addition, any such locality may include aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews in its definition of immediate family.



This is an amendment to Chapter 165 – Zoning, as it pertains to the discontinuance of nonconforming uses. The Code of Virginia, however; states that a two year period is required before a use can be deemed abandoned. This revision proposes to change the Zoning Ordinance requirement to two years in conformance with the Code of Virginia.

The Planning Commission discussed this at their October 5, 2016 meeting; the Planning Commission agreed with the change and noted that it would bring the Zoning Ordinance into compliance with the State Code. The Board of Supervisors discussed this item on October 26, 2016; the Board of Supervisors agreed with the proposed changes and sent the amendment forward for public hearing. ARTICLE IX NONCONFORMING USES, STRUCTURES AND SIGNS

Part 901 - Regulations

§ 165-901.01 Continuation of pre-existing uses, structures and signs.

Any use which does not conform to the requirements of this chapter at the effective adoption date of this chapter may be continued so long as it remains otherwise lawful. Structures and land may continue to be used as they were at the effective adoption date so long as they remain otherwise lawful. Any use, structure, or sign which subsequently becomes nonconforming as a result of amendments to this chapter may continue as it was at the time of the adoption of the amendment, as long as it remains otherwise lawful. Such nonconforming uses, structures, and signs shall conform to all laws in effect at the time when the use, structure, and signs were established.

- A. If any change of ownership, possession or lease of any legally nonconforming use, structure, or sign occurs, the use, structure, or sign may continue according to the requirements of this article.
- B. When the boundaries of a district are changed, any uses, structures, or signs which become nonconforming as a result of such change shall be subject to the provisions of this article.

§ 165-901.02 Discontinuance.

- A. If any legally nonconforming use or legally nonconforming sign is discontinued for a period exceeding one <u>two</u> year<u>s</u> after the enactment of this chapter, it shall be deemed to be abandoned, and any use or sign thereafter shall conform to the requirements of this chapter.
- B. Seasonal legally nonconforming uses that have been in continuous operation for a period of two years or more prior to the adoption of this chapter may be continued.

Code of Virginia

§ 15.2-2307. Vested rights not impaired; nonconforming uses.

C. A zoning ordinance may provide that land, buildings, and structures and the uses thereof which do not conform to the zoning prescribed for the district in which they are situated may be continued only so long as the then existing or a more restricted use continues and such use is not discontinued for more than two years, and so long as the buildings or structures are maintained in their then structural condition; and that the uses of such buildings or structures shall conform to such regulations whenever, with respect to the building or structure, the square footage of a building or structure is enlarged, or the building or structure is structurally altered as provided in the Uniform Statewide Building Code (§ 36-97 et seq.). If a use does not conform to the zoning prescribed for the district in which such use is situated, and if (i) a business license was issued by the locality for such use and (ii) the holder of such business license has operated continuously in the same location for at least 15 years and has paid all local taxes related to such use, the locality shall permit the holder of such business license to apply for a rezoning or a special use permit without charge by the locality or any agency affiliated with the locality for fees associated with such filing. Further, a zoning ordinance may provide that no nonconforming use may be expanded, or that no nonconforming building or structure may be moved on the same lot or to any other lot which is not properly zoned to permit such nonconforming use.





Removal of Motorcycle Repair from the B2 District

DATE: December 30, 2016

This is a proposed amendment to Chapter 165 – Zoning, to remove motorcycle repair from the B2 (General Business) District and include it in the M1 (Light Industrial) and M2 (Industrial General) Districts. Currently, motorcycle repair is permitted in the B2 (General Business) and B3 (Industrial Transition) Districts. Staff has drafted an amendment to remove motorcycle repair from the B2 District and adding it to the M1 and M2 Districts (in addition to it currently being allowed in the B3 District).



Indoor Recreation in the M1 and OM Districts

DATE: December 30, 2016

This is an amendment to Chapter 165 – Zoning, to include an allowance for amusement and recreation services operated indoors SIC 79 to be permitted through a Conditional Use Permit in the M1 (Light Industrial) District and the OM (Office-Manufacturing) District. Staff has limited the allowances to SIC 7941 (commercial sports), SIC 7991 (physical fitness facilities), SIC 7997 (membership sports and recreation clubs) and portions of 7999 (fitness and sports instruction). Staff has also drafted supplemental use regulations that would correspond to the use – additional requirements could be added during the Conditional Use Permit process if necessary.

The DRRC discussed this amendment at their September 2016 meeting. The DRRC agreed with the proposed change and the item was forwarded to the Planning Commission for discussion. The Planning Commission discussed this item on October 19; the Planning Commission agreed with the changes and sent the item forward for review by the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors discussed this item on November 9, 2016; the Board of Supervisors agreed with the proposed changes and sent the amendment forward for public hearing. The Planning Commission held a public hearing for this item at their December 7, 2016 meeting; there were no citizen comments and the Planning Commission ultimately recommended approval of the amendment.

The attached document shows the existing ordinance with the proposed changes supported by the DRRC and the Planning Commission (with bold italic for text added). This proposed amendment is being presented to the Board of Supervisors as a public hearing item. A decision by the Board of Supervisors on this proposed Zoning Ordinance text amendment is sought. 

SUBJECT: Public Hearing - Ordinance Amendment – Minor Site Plans

DATE: December 30, 2016

This is an amendment to Chapter 165 – Zoning, to modify the standards for the submittal of a minor site plan. The current threshold for a minor site plan is "a revision that increases an existing structure area by 20% or less and does not exceed 5,000 square feet of disturbed area". At the August meeting of the Development Review and Regulations Committee (DRRC), the Committee requested to increase the disturbed area from 5,000 square feet to 10,000 square feet to be consistent with the state requirements for a land disturbance permit.

The DRRC discussed this amendment at their September 2016 meeting. The DRRC agreed with the proposed change and the item was forwarded to the Planning Commission for discussion. The Planning Commission discussed this item on October 19; the Planning Commission agreed with the changes and sent the item forward for review by the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors discussed this item on November 9, 2016; the Board of Supervisors agreed with the proposed changes and sent the amendment forward for public hearing. The Planning Commission held a public hearing for this item at their December 7, 2016 meeting; there were no citizen comments and the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the amendment.

Part 802 - Site Plans

§ 165-802.03 Site plan and illustrative sketch plan contents.

- D. Minor Site Plans. A minor site plan may be submitted in lieu of a full site plan for additions to existing sites. A minor site plan shall constitute a revision that increases an existing structure area by 20% or less and does not exceed 5,000 10,000 square feet of disturbed area. Minor site plans, at a minimum shall include the following information:
 - (1) A title that includes the name of the proposed or existing business and a subtitle which describes the proposed development.
 - (2) The name, address, and phone number of the landowner, developer, and designer.
 - (3) The Frederick County Property Identification Number (PIN) of all lots included on the site plan.
 - (4) The total land area and total developed land area of all lots included on the site plan.
 - (5) A detailed description of the proposed use or uses of the development, as well as a description of the existing use or uses.
 - (6) A reference to any other site plan or master development plan approved by the County for the site.
 - (7) The date the site plan was prepared and a list of all revisions made, including the date and a description of why the site plan was revised.
 - (8) A table of contents including all pages of the site plan.
 - (9) An inset map showing the location of the site, along with the location of streets, roads and land uses within 500 feet of the property.
 - (10) A statement listing all requirements and conditions placed on the land included in the site plan resulting from approval of conditional zoning or a conditional use permit.
 - (11) A description of setbacks or conditions placed on the site as a result of an approved variance.
 - (12) The name of the Magisterial District within which property is located.
 - (13) Calculations showing the total number of required and proposed parking and loading spaces, including the total number of existing and proposed spaces.
 - (14) Calculations showing the total number of required perimeter and interior trees required, including the number of provided trees. The Zoning Administrator shall determine the number of landscaping plants required, proportional to the additions shown on the minor site plan.
 - (15) A signed seal of the certified Virginia land surveyor, architect, or engineer who prepared the plan.
 - (16) Any other information determined by the Zoning Administrator necessary for the review of the minor site plan.
 - (17) The Zoning Administrator may eliminate any of the above requirements on a minor site plan, if it is determined not to be warranted.

<u>Virginia Dept. of Transportation:</u> A VDOT review has been conducted for the Snowden Bridge Station (Omps) – Rezoning #03-05 Request, with a date of June 23, 2015. Based off of the review of the submittal, we have the following comment:

Item "h" under Transportation in the approved 2005 rezoning request needs to be incorporated into the 2016 rezoning request.

<u>Frederick County Attorney:</u> I have now reviewed the corrected proffer statement and it is my opinion that it would be in a form to meet the requirements of the Frederick County Zoning Ordinance and the Code of Virginia, and would be legally sufficient as a proffer statement, subject to the following comments:

Proffer 1f and 1g- It would be appropriate to state some time frame for performance of these proffers, such as within x days of request by the County.

Proffer 2 – Staff will want to note that the proposed square footage limitation remains the same for the land area subject to this rezoning (59.223 acres) as it was for the larger land area that was subject to the 2005 rezoning (79.13 acres), within which area the current land area is encompassed.

Proffer 3 – On the last line at the bottom of the page, "by" should be deleted before "to".

Planning & Zoning:

1) Site History:

The original Frederick County zoning map (U.S.G.S. Winchester, VA Quadrangle) identifies the majority of the subject property as being zoned A-2 (Agriculture General). The County's agricultural zoning districts were combined to form the RA (Rural Areas) District upon adoption of an amendment to the Frederick County Zoning Ordinance on May 10, 1989. The corresponding zoning map resulted in the re-mapping of this portion of the subject property and all other A-1 and A-2 rezoned land to the RA District. The remainder of the property was identified as being zoned R-3. 



Preliminary Matters

Pursuant to Section 15.2-2296 Et. Seq. of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and the provisions of the Frederick County Zoning Ordinance with respect to conditional zoning, the undersigned applicant hereby proffers that in the event the Board of Supervisors of Frederick County, Virginia, shall approve Rezoning Application #03-05 for the rezoning of the 79.13-acres tract from the Rural Areas (RA) District, to Light Industrial (M1) District, development of the subject property shall be done in conformity with the terms and conditions set forth herein, except to the extent that such terms and conditions may be subsequently amended or revised by the applicant and such be approved by the Frederick County Board of Supervisors in accordance with the said Code and Zoning Ordinance. In the event that such rezoning is not granted, then these proffers shall be deemed withdrawn and have no effect whatsoever. These proffers shall be binding upon the applicants and their legal successors, heirs, or assigns.

The subject property is more particularly described as the land owned by North Stephenson, Inc. being all of Tax Map Parcels 43-((A))-150, 43-((A))-151, 43-((A))-151A, 43-((A))-152, 43C-((3))-2, 43C-((3))-3, 43C-((3))-4, 43C-((3))-4A, 43C-((3))-5, and 43C-((3))-7A, as evidence by recorded property deeds in the Frederick County Clerk of Court Office included with this rezoning proposal.

PROJECT PROFFER STATEMENT

1.) Transportation

- a) The applicants hereby proffer to construct, or cause for the construction of dual southbound left turn lanes on Martinsburg Pike (U.S. Route 11 North) at the major collector road intersection with Renzi Drive at the Rutherford's Farm Industrial Park. The southbound dual left turn lanes will be constructed at the same time that the Rutherford's Farm Industrial Park improvements to Martinsburg Pike are constructed.
- b) The applicants hereby proffer to construct, or cause for the construction of a right turn lane within the Martinsburg Pike (U.S. Route 11 North) right-of-way at a location and distance acceptable to VDOT between the intersection of Redbud Road (Route 661) and the major collector road intersection serving as the primary entrance to the 79.13-acre project site. A traffic study will be prepared and submitted to VDOT as a component of the site development plan for each proposed land use on the 79.13-acre site to allow VDOT to determine when the proffered improvement is warranted.
- c) The applicants hereby proffer to provide for the dedication of right-of-way and for the allowance of temporary construction easements needed for the ultimate design of the major collector road from the CSX railroad to Martinsburg Pike. The dedicated right-of-way shall provide for the improvements identified from station 10+00 to station 24+00 on the Stephenson Village Major Collector Road Plan and CSX Crossing prepared by Greenway Engineering and dated October 2004, which is included as an exhibit with this proffer statement. The applicants further proffer to provide for the dedication of right-of-way acceptable to VDOT for the purpose of providing a right turn lane from the major collector road onto the internal street connection located at station 17+00 on the subject exhibit.
- d) The applicants hereby proffer to enter into a signalization agreement with VDOT for the provision of a traffic signal at the major collector road intersection with Martinsburg Pike, which will align with Renzi Drive at the Rutherford's Farm Industrial Park. The signalization agreement shall provide for the pro-rata share of the traffic signal based on the projected traffic volumes identified in the Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA) compared to the projected traffic volumes identified in the TIA for the Rutherford's Farm Industrial Park and the TIA for the Stephenson Village Residential Planned Community.

- e) The applicants hereby proffer to prepare and submit a traffic study to VDOT as a component of the site development plan for each proposed land use on the 79.13-acre site to a determine the portion of the major collector road that will be required to be constructed based on the impacts associated with each future land use.
- f) The applicants hereby proffer to dedicate right-of-way to VDOT along Redbud Road for future improvements to the Interstate 81 Exit 317 interchange area. This right-of-way shall be dedicated to VDOT within 180 days of final engineering plan approval. The preparation of right-of-way dedication plats and legal documents associated with this dedication shall be prepared by parties other than the applicants.
- g) The applicants hereby proffer to dedicate a 50-foot right-of-way and provide temporary construction easements to VDOT for the purpose of realigning Redbud Road (Route 661) from the current intersection at Martinsburg Pike (U.S. Route 11 North) to connect to the major collector road on the subject site. The purpose of the 50-foot right-of-way dedication and temporary construction easements is to provide VDOT and Frederick County with an appropriate alternative to relocate Redbud Road. The dedicated 50-foot right-of-way will connect to the intersection that is identified at station 17+00 on the Stephenson Village Major Collector Road Plan and CSX Crossing prepared by Greenway Engineering and dated October 2004, which is included as an exhibit with this proffer statement. The location of the 50-foot right-of-way to connect to this intersection will be agreed upon by VDOT and the property owners to allow for a minimum 25 mph geometric design criteria and will be made available at such a time that VDOT deems necessary. The preparation of right-of-way dedication plats and legal documents associated with this dedication shall be prepared by parties other than the applicants. The construction of the realigned portion of Redbud Road shall occur by parties other than the applicants.
- h) The applicants hereby proffer to prohibit commercial entrances along the western property line on tax parcel 43-((A))-152 adjoining the Redbud Road (Route 661) right-of-way. This proffer is intended to prohibit commercial entrance locations on the current alignment of Redbud Road and is not intended to prohibit commercial entrances internally to the subject site should Redbud Road be realigned through the subject site resulting from the widening of Interstate 81.

2.) Structural Development

The applicants hereby proffer to limit the structural development on the 79.13-acre to a maximum of 800,000 square-feet of total floor area.

3.) Environmental Protection

The applicants hereby proffer to provide for the delineation of karst features located on the 79.13-acre site as a condition of master development plan approval. The applicants further proffer to conduct geotechnical analysis for each site plan in which structural development or other site improvements are located within 50 feet of identified karst features. The geotechnical analysis reports and methods for treatment of impacts shall be provided to the Frederick County Engineer for review and approval as a condition of site development plan approval.

4.) Viewshed Mitigation

The applicants hereby proffer to prohibit the placement of freestanding and building mounted illuminated and non-illuminated business signs facing the eastern property line of tax map parcel 43-((A))-152 to mitigate viewshed impacts from the 3rd Winchester Core Battlefield Area.

5.) Fire and Rescue Monetary Contribution

The applicants hereby proffer to provide a monetary contribution of \$0.01 per square foot of structural development on the 79.13-acre site occurring subsequent to rezoning approval. This monetary contribution shall be provided to Frederick County at the time of building permit issuance for structural development, which may generate a maximum monetary contribution of \$8,000.00 based on the proffered maximum square footage of structural development. The applicants monetary contribution will be directed to the Clearbrook Volunteer Fire and Rescue Company, which will provide first due response to the subject site.

6.) Martinsburg Pike Corridor Enhancement

The applicants hereby proffer to provide corridor enhancements along Martinsburg Pike. The location and type of enhancements for this corridor will be identified on the Master Development Plan for the 79.13-acre project site.

7.) Signatures

The conditions proffered above shall be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, assigns and successors in the interest of the applicant and owner. In the event the Frederick County Board of Supervisors grants this rezoning and accepts the conditions, the proffered conditions shall apply to the land rezoned in addition to other requirements set forth in the Frederick County Code.


